SERMON JOTTINGS

As we continue through this time of COVID, and possible quarantine, it is sometimes difficult to follow the continuum of church lessons and sermons. Here are some summary notes from November's services.

Date: November 8, 2020, Mr. Paul Zachow, M.A.P.S

Text: Amos 5:18-24

Sermon: Serving God with Justice and Righteousness

Amos was condemning the northern Kingdom of Israel for oppressive treatment of people within the kingdom.

- Amos noted that the powerful and wealthy thrive and the oppressed do not. We are seeing the same thing today.
- This is morally and ethically wrong. God calls us to do better and asks for peace and unity in our country and world where all people are accepted and loved.
- Be kind, do justice, walk humbly with God (Micah 6:8).
- All of us are the hands and feet of God and Christ in our hurting world.

Date: November 15, 2020, Mr. Paul Zachow, M.A.P.S

Text: Psalm 34:1-10, 22 Sermon: Giving Thanks

The book of Psalms is a book of instruction from which much can be learned. Psalm 34 is a psalm of thanksgiving and gratitude to God by King David for sparing his life from conflict with King Ashish of Gath.

- Today, the same hope and gratitude shown by King David calls us to thank God for our blessings (i.e., our lives, the harvest, food, homes, and God's love). What else are you grateful for?
- We should remember the positive blessings in our lives and be grateful to God for them and for one another.
- It is a good exercise to set aside the negativity of the present world and give thanks to God for our blessings.
- Start by going to God in prayer and honesty asking for help in our lives. God loves us and wants the best for us. Trust in Him. Call on Him in times of joy and in times of need.



Date: **November 29, 2020,** Pastor Cathy Manthei Text: Mark 13:24-37

- Advent is a season to focus on Christ. Mark's scripture talks about the second coming. He also emphasizes that only the Father knows when this will happen.
- We are called to be a people of action.
- At FPCR the Food Pantry is living out what God wants us to be
- Gifts have been entrusted to us to use faithfully.
- It matters that we believe. We need to proclaim Him and follow Him. We need to take this seriously.
- It matters how we treat each other and those around us.
- We know that Jesus was here, is here today, and is coming back. It doesn't matter when—it matters what we do with the time.
- Mother Teresa: Christians are not called to be successful and perfect, but to be faithful.
- We should not be afraid, worried or surprised when He returns.
- He is telling us in the scripture: "Keep going, don't quit, I'm right here beside vou!"
