# SOAP DONATIONS ARE HANDMADE

One of the categories of donations the Slinger Food Pantry often has on their list is *Personal Hygiene Products*—one of the many items donated by the FPCR family. What you may not know is that the soap donated in April to the Slinger Food Pantry was handmade with natural ingredients by **Jean Schoeni**. Jean, whose background is in microbiology, loves to experiment with a variety of crafts—none of which are more exciting to her than those using her





glycerin to provide soap that is

moisturizing, soothing, and cleansing. Sometimes the bars include exfoliants

(coffee grounds, poppy seeds, oatmeal, dried mint leaves). After carefully mixing

the base recipe, the batch can be poured

into a mold as is or colored and poured.

When fragrance is added, the batch needs

science lab skills.

The soaps donated for the April FPCR drop off were beautiful. They included bars without scent while others were made with soothing fragrances like Warm Woods, Cucumber-Melon, Grapefruit-Rosemary-Peppermint, or even Orange-Vanilla to name a few. Pantry visitors will be able to select from a variety of colors such as Lake Blue, Bright Golden, Jade, Orange, Bronze or a mixture of colors, all created with mica powders.

Jean mixes a variety of oils/ fats, lye, and **Top Left:** Lemon-Poppyseed, **Top Right:** Orange-Clove, and **Bottom**: Lavender-Peppermint.

# SERMON JOTTINGS

Following are summary notes from April's sermons by Pulpit Supply Mr. Paul Zachow, MAPS/ Chaplain.

## Date: **April 10, 2022** (Palm Sunday) Text: **Luke 19:28-40** Sermon: *The Stones Shout Out*

On Palm Sunday, the Scripture reading was the familiar story of Jesus riding a donkey with his disciples and multitudes of people laying down their coats on the road while shouting praises. They are proclaiming him king and are amazed at the things he has done. Jesus is bringing a new power to the world—God's power. Jesus was a different kind of king from Caesar and Herod, who were greedy for power and money, oppressive,

dictatorial, and unkind and unloving. We are back to the controversy—Power of God vs. Power of the Roman Empire! Palm Sunday is not the end of this story.

- This is the point where we need to ask ourselves, "What kind of Jesus do we need in our broken lives, broken church, broken country, society, community, and world during this passion and Easter season?"
- Jesus came to liberate those who were oppressed and set them free. Jesus does the same for us.
- Peace can only come from God in Christ.
- Following Jesus can help to bring God's peace to our world and to us.
- There continues to be a clash of kingdoms—Caesar or Christ. Whom and what do we follow—today's world or the world Jesus can bring?

Date: **April 17, 2022** (Easter Sunday) Text: **John 20:1-18** Sermon: *Resurrection Joy!* 

Easter—the day of resurrection! Mary Magdalene goes to the tomb and is distraught because Jesus's body is gone. She fears someone has stolen his body. A gardener

appears. She recognizes him as Jesus. He explains that he must still ascend to God. She is tasked with informing the disciples of Jesus's resurrection. This is the beginning of the Jesus movement.

- In spite of darkness and death, there is hope.
- Where do we need to let go of things which no longer serve us?
- Where have you had darkness in your life interrupted by the recognition of a "resurrection" of new life and new hope? This can give us awe as it did Mary.
- Jesus calls God, "Father." God works through Jesus; Jesus is the Father's "Son". Through this gospel, we recognize that those who have faith become beloved "Children of God".

dividing the batch. Each portion is individually tempered, colored, and scented before pouring. After about 24 hours wrapped in a blanket or insulated in a Styrofoam container, the soap can be unmolded. If made in a loaf mold, bars must be cut. This is Jean's husband, Keith Clark's job because he can cut straight! Curing, hardening, and rying the soap takes four to six weeks. When it was announced that the Romanskis would be making a delivery to the Slinger Food Pantry, the soap was wrapped, labeled, and added to the donations collected at the church.

Jean's goal is to fill the Pantry's ongoing soap needs. The Slinger Food Pantry is thrilled to receive the soap, along with all of the other donations from the FPCR family.
